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# Universities: Managing the Risks of Growth



### **Unprecedented Market Growth:**

Education is one of the driving forces of the Australian economy; in 2014, the industry brought in \$27.8 billion in revenue<sup>6</sup>. This makes it the fourth largest export and largest non-mineral export.<sup>1</sup>

International education services is Australia's third largest export and drives at least 130,000 full time employees

In 2014, HEPs brought in \$27.8b. Of which \$16b accounted for exports Australian universities are experiencing broad growth across the board at unprecedented levels. Most universities have seen doubledigit growth since places started to be uncapped in 2010.<sup>2</sup>

International education services is now a major driving economics force and is Australia's third largest export and drives at least 130,000 full time equivalent jobs around Australia.<sup>3</sup> Total international student enrolments have surged by 11% over the past year and accounts for \$16 billion yearly.<sup>4</sup>

"Over the next twenty years, demand for higher education are likely to experience significant growth, if only due to demographic change. Australia needs to urgently consider how best to meet the needs of these additional students, as well as address how best to match higher education training to the needs of the Australian workforce. Attention will also need to be given to ensuring a pipeline of academic staff is ready and prepared to fill the expected gaps in the workforce as the current wave of senior academics begin to retire."<sup>5</sup>

#### UNIVSERITY GROWTH WILL PRESENT OPPORUTNITIES BUT ALSO UNIQUE CHALLENGES


As a result of fast paced growth, universities have been facing numerous administrative and systemic challenges:
